

#799 EVALUATION OF THE VAGINAL DELIVERY EXPERIENCE AT A MATERNITY HOSPITAL IN PATIENTS WITH AND WITHOUT PERINEAL INJURY



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AIM

A positive birth experience -> woman feel supported, in control, secure, and respected (1).

A negative birth experience -> feelings and reactions of distress -> short- and long-term impacts on the woman's health and well-being (2).

To evaluate and compare the birth experience of women with intact perineum, selective episiotomy, and different grades of laceration.

METHODS

- Cross-sectional study.
- Women >18 years, up to 1 year after a vaginal delivery.
- Birth Experience Questionnaire (CEQ-B) (domains: self-efficacy, professional support, perceived safety, women's participation in labor/delivery)
 - o higher scores -> better experience.
- 5 groups: Group IP (intact perineum); Group L1 (grade 1 laceration); Group L2 (grade 2 laceration); Group L3-4 (grades 3 and 4 lacerations); and Group E (selective episiotomy).
- ANOVA with Tukey's post hoc test (p<0.05)

RESULTS

- 151 patients: 32 patients in the IP group; 40 in the L1 group; 29 in the L2 group; 27 in the L3-4 group; and 23 in the E group.
- 113 patients lithotomy position, 2 standing, 24 in the side lying position, 6 on a birthing stool, 5 on all fours, and 1 patient in the squatting position.
- 3 patients received pain relief medication.








- Total score

CONCLUSIONS

Severe perineal trauma (grades 3-4) negatively affects the birth experience, especially in perceptions of professional support and safety. Prevention of severe trauma and enhanced professional support are essential to improve women's overall birth experience.
