What is the International Continence Society and what does it do?

The International Continence Society (ICS) is a membership society for professionals working in the field of incontinence.

The objectives for which the Charity has been established are:

- The advancement of basic and clinical sciences concerned with the function and dysfunction of the urinary tract, bowel and pelvic floor.
- To raise public awareness of both urinary and anal incontinence, and other functional abnormalities, including obstruction and pain, and the fact that it can be corrected, improved or at least better managed, and to enhance the knowledge and skills of health professionals involved in prevention and management of incontinence and thereby to improve the standard of healthcare delivery

Considerable public benefit arises from these two aspects of the Society's educational work. With regard to the general public, significant and often harmful misunderstandings and stigmas still surround relevant medical conditions. With regard to healthcare professionals, their knowledge and skills are increased, to the benefit of current and future patients, by the dissemination of knowledge and sharing of best practice at events such as the Society's annual international scientific meeting and the workshops and courses it facilitates (many of which are offered for free). The ICS continues to allow free access to its website to allow non-ICS members to utilise the vast database of incontinence research now held within it. For those interested in becoming members of the ICS, the membership fee remains low and affordable. It is in this regard that the ICS Board of Trustees has considered the public benefit of the ICS. The ICS feels that it clearly has the Charities Act aims of advancement of education and of health or the saving of lives. The ICS now has members in over 70 countries and therefore is helping individuals suffering from incontinence related issues on a global level.

Scientific knowledge and expertise on incontinence issues are exchanged between the multidisciplinary medical professionals through the various forums which the ICS provides, including the Annual Scientific Meeting, newsletters and publication of research through Journals. Best practices from countries with established continence awareness programmes are shared with others who are trying to set up continence programmes within their country, hospital or clinic. With the dissemination of research into incontinence relief, the direct beneficiaries are the patients of those individuals who are members of the ICS or those who attend our congresses and courses. The main objectives for 2010 were to put in place the activities identified as part of the three year strategy. In addition, overall aims were to continue increasing the membership of the Society, through affiliating with other similar societies, and from countries visited by the ICS to hold an Education Course. In addition, the Charity aimed to encourage more delegates to submit abstracts for presentation at the Annual Meeting. This in turn is expected to encourage a greater attendance at the Annual Meeting.

History:

With Peter Caldwell as president, Shedden Alexander as vice president and Eric Glen as the organising secretary, the inaugural meeting of the Continent Club was held in Exeter in 1971. Over 60 participants attended the meeting from several countries and it was hailed as a great success, both scientifically and socially.

At the same meeting Dr Smeekes, from The Hague, emphasised the importance of standardising the nomenclature used in urodynamics.

At the third ICS conference held in Copenhagen in 1973, Tage Hald was elected first Chair of the ICS Standardisation Committee. His committee published the first ICS reports between 1976 and 1981. The Society has gone on to publish many reports and retains the copyright, enabling them to be published in a range of international journals.

In 1998 the Society was set up as a UK Charity under the guidance of Paul Abrams and now boasts a membership of over 2,000 from 70 different countries covering many disciplines including physicians, surgeons, nurses, physicists, physiotherapists, bio-medical engineers and scientists. The founder members decided that the Society should meet annually with a different meeting chair and venue each year. This Annual Meeting remains today one of the most valued dates in the urological and gynaecological calendars, attracting in excess of 3,000 delegates from all corners of the globe.

Structure, Governance and Management

Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees is required to meet two times per year and is responsible for:

- The long-term direction of the Society
- The development of new projects in line with the Society's charitable aims
- Ensuring the Society's charitable aims and objectives are met
- Inspection of the Society's annual accounts
- Ensuring suitable accounting policies are established and applied consistently
- Monitoring and reporting the financial position to membership
- Safeguarding the assets of the charity and applying them properly
- Ensuring the Society is operating efficiently and effectively
- Ensuring proper records and reliable financial information are maintained
- Method, policies and procedures for recruitment, appointment, induction and training of new trustees

All nominated candidates for trustee positions will receive documents outlining their duties,

responsibilities and any risks pertaining to the role of trustee. They can request attendance at a meeting of the Board of Trustees as observers, in preparation of their possible appointment, with the agreement of the Board.

The Nominations Committee will review all candidates for their suitability, prior to their nominations being put to the membership. All trustees are elected by the membership.

The Trustees have initiated a Statement of Policy with regard to the recruitment, induction and training of committee members. This endeavours to ensure that individuals with an interest in the works of the charity, with appropriate range of expertise and sufficiently diverse skills to provide a reasonable representation of the community are recruited, appointed and subsequently adequately versed in the affairs of the charity and the requirements and responsibilities of charity trusteeship.

Management Structure

The ICS is a Company Limited by Guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, together with regularly updated Bylaws. These reflect the current activities of the Charity.

As a UK Registered Charity, the ICS Trustees are held responsible ultimately for the Charity and its affairs. However, the Society has a management structure and Bylaws which ensure that members have sufficient input on all decisions within the Society. The ICS is now made up of a large reinforced Board of Trustees which reflects the multi-disciplinary and geographical aspects of the society. These Trustees were nominated and elected by the membership and all major disciplines of the ICS are represented. Day-to-day management of the ICS has been delegated to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee are members of the Board of Trustees and were voted in by the Trustees.

Under supervision of the Trustees and the Executive Committee, day-to-day management of the Charity, the Society, its trading subsidiary and office staff, is delegated to the Administrative Manager. The Administrative Manager is a full-time employee of the Society and its trading subsidiary and reports directly to the Trustees who are ultimately responsible for the management and finances of the Society, as well as the review and approval of administrative procedures implemented by the Administrative Manager.

ICS Committees 2010

The ICS currently has the following committees which focus on the different aspects of the ICS and through the direction of the Board of Trustees undertake projects to assist the Board to achieve its overall strategy and for the Charity to meet its aims.

A chair for each of the above-mentioned committees is elected by electronic membership ballot, to hold office for three years (with the exception of the Scientific Committee chair who is in post for one year). Further information about the remit of each committee can be found on the ICS website.

Related Parties

The Charity's wholly owned subsidiary Conticom ICS Limited was established to undertake the commercial trading activities of the Charity. Conticom ICS Limited gift aids its profits to the Charity.

Risk Management

The Trustees have implemented a formal risk management process to assess business risks and implement risk management strategies.

The Trustees have identified the types of risks the Charity faces, and have prioritised them in terms of potential impact and likelihood of occurrence, and identified, where possible, means of mitigating the risks. The adequacy of internal controls is reviewed and costs of implementing new controls compared to benefits obtained and implemented, if agreed. Procedures have been established for reporting failure, immediately, to appropriate levels of management and to the Board of Trustees. The task of monitoring the Charity's financial control systems and procedures is delegated to the ICS Treasurer (Ajay Singla). In conjunction with the Administrative Manager and the Charity's auditors (Goldwyns [Bristol] Limited), the Treasurer reviews and reports to the Trustees on the working of these systems and procedures in relation to the wider issue of managing major risks identified as arising from or in connection with the Charity's activities.

The Trustees continue to keep under review the adequacy of our systems which are, in our opinion, appropriate for the Charity at present.

The Trustees believe an area of risk requiring particular attention is the ICS Annual Meeting, where possible cancellation or postponement due to terrorist attacks or natural disasters is a major concern. The Charity has passed on the major risk to our new permanent Congress Organiser who, from 2008, has born the financial risk of any cancellation or postponement. The Trustees are also ensuring that adequate levels of insurance are sought for each event.

A Nominations Committee has now been established to ensure that suitable Trustee candidates are put forward for ballot by the membership.

Although all efforts are made to ensure the administration of the Society could continue efficiently should certain key members of staff leave or be absent for any length of time, the positions of Administrative Manager and IT Director are of particular importance.

With regard to the Society's finances, the bookkeeper and Auditors are fully aware of the current status and systems used and could take over from the Administrative Manager in an emergency. A selected group of the Trustees and the Administrative Manager are all signatories to the Society's accounts and therefore the accounts can be maintained.

With regard to IT systems, the IT Director is documenting all design and maintenance work to ensure that another IT specialist could take over in an emergency. All systems and the ICS website are backed up and stored off site.

Wherever possible, all ICS office staff are trained and briefed in all office procedures.

Objectives and Activities

The strategies employed in the year under review to achieve the Charity's objectives were:

- Implementation of the activities identified as part of the three year strategy
- To host the 2010 Annual Meeting in Toronto joint with the International Urogynecological Association (IUGA) and to increase delegate numbers and therefore income.
- To continue Educational Courses
- To increase membership levels

Achievements and Performance

ICS Three Year Strategy

Jacques Corcos, appointed ICS General Secretary in 2008, agreed a three year strategy with the Board of Trustees and the ICS membership. The main objectives are:-

- The development of science with greater accessibility by all to research, training and scientific information
- A revisit of the Society's structure and governance, including a deep analysis of how our money is acquired and spent
- Attention and pro-action to address incontinence among the disadvantaged

The taskforces, which were set up in 2009, continued with their work, bringing recommendations to the Board for agreement. The following describes their individual achievements.

Meetings Task Force:

Introduced benchmarked Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM) budgets and updated the ASM guidelines accordingly. In addition, in light of results from the annual meeting survey, the cost of ICS social events has been allocated set limits.

Industry Task Force: This Task Force has been looking into ways in which the ICS can enter into relationships with industry while doing so in an ethical way and one that helps the ICS meet its objectives.

Awards Task Force:

The Task Force has implemented new awards and fellowships, to join the existing opportunities available for the public benefit of the ICS membership and beyond. The new awards/fellowships are fellowships in research/clinical and neurourology/urodynamics; the latter is supported by Laborie.

Scientific Task Force:

Plans for research grants are now finalised, with two available: the Emerging Team grant, and the Pilot Research Grant. In total these awards offer £60,000 in funding for the selected candidates.

Foreign Affairs Task Force:

Continued affiliations with the Turkish Continence Society and the Italian Society for Urodynamics (SIUD). Plans are in motion for the Iranian Continence Society and the Pan Arab Continence Society to affiliate in late 2010 or early 2011. Discussions are underway with a number of other societies who are interested in affiliating in 2011. The Task Force also plan to hold a special meeting at the 2011 annual meeting, whereby the ICS will meet national societies to better explain the benefits of affiliating with the ICS. Affiliation and close links to other societies remains a strategy of the ICS.

Governance Task Force:

The group modified its structure to include more trustees, and changed its title to the Internal Structure Governance Task Force. The main roles/objectives are to consider external advice and then amend the governance structure of the ICS to suit strategical requirements. The group held its third meeting in December 2010. It was agreed to propose to the Board of Trustees that a new governance model for the ICS be introduced in 2011. The Task Force is also working to ensure that all ICS committees have a valid and coherent terms of reference document. When complete, these will be placed on the ICS website for reference by the ICS membership.

Incontinence and Fistula for the Disadvantaged Task Force:

This Task Force has now been disbanded and set up instead as a formal Fistula Committee. The committee ran its first fistula surgical training course in Cairo, Egypt in January 2010. Evaluation results from the course were positive and more courses are now in the planning stages.

ICS Annual Scientific Meeting 2010

The Annual Meeting remains the main focus of the ICS and consists of a scientific programme selected from submitted abstracts, along with workshops, courses, committee meetings and the Society's Annual General Meeting. The ICS policies, with respect to the Annual Meeting, are to be found in 'The ICS Annual Meeting Guidelines', which is available from the ICS office or website (www.icsoffice.org).

The 40th Annual Meeting of the International Continence Society took place this year in Toronto, Canada. This was the third joint meeting with IUGA (International Urogynecological Association). The meeting was attended by 3534 delegates from 74 countries, and had over 40 exhibition stands. The Trustees were very pleased to see a record attendance, especially considering that the meeting took place during the continuing economic downturn.

The joint meeting achieved its highest ever number of submitted abstracts at 1374, with 1253 accepted and 298 presented orally in 30 sessions. This is a strong indication that the joint meetings are valued scientifically by medical profressionals internationally. All 2010 abstracts were made available on a usb stick given to each delegate. All abstracts are also available to read in full on the ICS website.

The education programme consisted of 48 workshops, chosen from a record 108 applications. Attendance was slightly lower than normal in these workshops and this will be taken into consideration for the future. The AGM saw the re-appointment of a Trustee and the Treasurer. The membership also voted in favour of amendments to the ICS Articles of Association.

According to the Annual Scientific Meeting guidelines, the Chairman must identify a Charity or not-for-profit institution with similar aims to the ICS which will receive a donation from the ICS of €50,000. Due to the joint meeting, this year €50,000 was allocated to each joint chairman: Sender Herschorn as the ICS representative, and Harold Drutz as the IUGA representative. Sender Herschorn's charitable donation was to the Mount Sinai Hospital, Gynecology Research Fund. Harold Drutz's charitable donation was to Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre, Urology, Education and Research Fund.

Our sincere thanks go to Sender Herschorn, Harold Drutz and their organising committee for their hard work and commitment to making the joint ICS-IUGA meeting the success it was.

The Charity's wholly owned subsidiary Conticom-ICS Limited, operates the Annual Meeting and its profit is gift aided to the ICS.

Educational Courses 2010

The ICS Education Committee has continued its successful add-on educational course format. Add-on courses are where the ICS contributes with faculty to an existing local meeting. Add-on courses have a number of benefits over stand-alone courses as they allow the ICS to have more courses at already established meetings ensuring correct target audience and bearing less risk.

Therefore, by focusing on add-on courses a wider range of educational opportunities can be undertaken each year, which allows the ICS to further extend the sharing of good practice and knowledge. The Educational Course Guidelines have been updated in general, and work is underway to make the development of add-on courses more inclusive across other ICS medical disciplines.

Courses held in 2010 are outlined below.

Sharm, Egypt, 4-6 February 2010

The first add-on education course of 2010 was held in collaboration with the 6th Pan Arab Continence Society (PACS) meeting. Six ICS speakers attended the meeting: Werner Schaefer, Soren Brostrøm, Jacques Corcos, Marcus Drake, Hashim Hashim and Helmut Madersbacher. The 2.5 day programme was attended by approximately 180 delegates attended.

Santiago, Chile, 22-24 April 2010

In April 2010, the ICS and the Chilean Society of Urology jointly held an education course focused on Dysfunction of the Lower Urinary Tract, in Santiago, Chile. The course began with a Urodynamics workshop attended by 60 delegates. The full education course was held over 23-24 April and was attended by no fewer than 200 participants from Chile, Argentina and Peru. The ICS sent four speakers. The speakers' chosen subjects were greatly valued by the delegates who actively participated during the round table sessions.

Bucharest, Romania, 7-8 May 2010

The first ICS educational course in Romania was held as an add-on course to the 7th National Congress of the Romanian Society of Uro-Gynaecology. Eight ICS speakers presented at the course, including topics in the field of nursing, urology, gynaecology and physiotherapy. There were 400 registered participants, including, gynaecologists, neurologists, rehabilitation medicine doctors, urologists, physiotherapists and nurses. The objectives of this course were: to present the current standards of incontinence care to the different specialities involved, to raise the interest of the physiotherapist in pelvic floor rehabilitation, to start nurses training as continence nurses, to give a state-of-the-art presentation on neuro-urology.

Istanbul, Turkey, 22-24 September 2010

A highly successful multi-disciplinary education course on prevention of childbirth-induced pelvic floor dysfunction was held in Istanbul, Turkey. The course was offered in collaboration with the meeting of the Turkish Society of Urogynecology and Pelvic Reconstructive Surgery. Thirteen faculty from Turkey and four international faculty attended from the ICS. Course content was comprehensive and based on the most current research evidence. Topics addressed the physiological changes of the pelvic floor during childbirth and injury and epidemiology of childbirth-related pelvic floor dysfunction.

Beijing, China, 26-27 September 2010

The fourth visit of the ICS to China was held at the brand new and impressive University of Peking Wu Xieping Urology Center in Beijing. The visit was ground-breaking, as it included for the first time in China an ICS specialist continence nursing course. This was run for a full day by ICS speakers, Mandy Fader and Katherine Moore, and was attended by 300 nurses in a well-filled auditorium. On the medical side, a well-attended urodynamics workshop was run by ICS speakers, Marcus Drake and Werner Schaefer, covering technical and clinical aspects of good urodynamic practice.

Limassol, Cyprus, 23-27 October 2010

The second ICS course in Greece was held as an add-on course to the 20th National Congress of the Panhellenic Annual Urological Meeting. Six ICS speakers presented at the course, including topics in the field of urology, gynecology. Stavros Charalambous, the host to the ICS, described the course as a truly an invaluable experience.

Guest lectures

Official ICS lectures continue to be another effective and economic form of educational and promotional activity for ICS. These are presented at relevant events by qualified ICS members, either by invitation, or on suggestion and with financial support of the ICS.

Belgium

Dirk de Ridder presented an ICS lecture at the Fédération des Associations et Sociétés d'Urologie (FASULF) meeting held in Brussels, Belgium

Italy

Karl-Dietrich Sievert delivered a lecture, titled "Stem cells and Nerve re-routing in lower urinary tract dysfunctions. What is true and what is false?" to the SIUD's annual meeting in Verona, Italy.

Brazil

Werner Schaefer delivered an internet lecture to to the South Brazilian Urology Conference, held in Porto Alegre, Brazil.

Chile

Francesco Pesce gave a lecture on "Pudenal Neuropathy" at the 2010 CAU meeting in Santiago, Chile.

Turkey

Peter Rosier presented a lectures on "ICS standardisation of terminology" at the annual meeting of the Turkish Association of Urology. Peter, Victor Nitti, Ajay Singla and Roger Dmochowski represented the ICS at a Urodynamic training workshop also held during the conference.

South Africa

The ICS sent two speakers to Durban, South Africa to present at the 28th Biannual Congress Of The Urological Association Of South Africa (SAUA 2010). An ICS office member also attended to promote the ICS at the meeting's exhibtion.

ICS Membership

For the third year running the ICS achieved its record number of membership subscriptions of 2403 in 2010 (2341 in 2009). increase in membership was represented by 484 new members and 1919 returning members, a very impressive retention ratio of 80%. The Annual Membership subscription fee remains at £50 even though this is at a loss to the ICS, it is felt that it is important to keep the subscription low to encourage more members from varying disciplines and to not discriminate those with lower incomes.

The ICS would have expected a larger increase in 2010, but the joint annual meeting meant that membership was split across IUGA and the ICS in order to achieve the annual meeting discount. The ICS hopes, and expects break our membership record for the fourth year running in 2011.

Other committee activities

There were several projects that occurred in 2010 and some notables achievements are highlighted.

Fistula Committee

The ICS ran its first workshop on Fistula in January 2010. The workshop was held at Ain Shams University Hospital in Cairo, Egypt. Applications were requested for places on the workshop, with 5 spaces offered as full contribution (flights, course fees and accommodation covered by the ICS), 3 as partial contribution (course fees and accommodation covered by the ICS), and 2 as no contribution (all fees paid by the participant). The group were involved intraoperatively with the repair of 6 real life fistula cases with variable causes. Evaluation scores were impressive, with one participant saying that he now felt much more confident to use the techniques he had just learnt, while another was really excited to be equipped with the requisite experience and know-how to be able to operate on cases waiting for him at his hospital. The workshop directly meets the aims of the ICS to prevent, treat and care for incontinence. This also meets the third item of the 3 year action plan, to proactively address incontinence among the disadvantaged. A further two workshops are planned for 2011.

Continence Promotion Committee

The second World Continence Week was held in 2010 from June 21-27. The aim of World Continence Week is to raise awareness of bladder and bowel health issues and improve the lives of people with incontinence worldwide by drawing the attention of the general public and the global medical community to the life situation of people with incontinence. An increasing number of events are being held worldwide to mark this special week, ranging from public forums in Japan to a public outdoor health fayre in Chicago, USA.

Publications and Communications Committee

The committee ensured that the twice yearly ICS News publication was published to the highest standards. The team behind ICS News received a warm round of applause at the AGM. The committee is now looking at a more engaging way of sending ICS news items to members. The committee also organised the official ICS press conference during the annual meeting.

Nursing Committee

The committee's Nursing Practice sub-committee sent out two international surveys regarding

nursing practices. The results of these surveys were presented at the nursing forum during the annual meeting. The committee plan to make more extensive use of the ICS website in their communication with nurses and ICS members.

Education Committee

The committee plans and delivers all of the ICS education courses and guest lectures, as explained in more detail in this report. The committee delivered its highest number ever of both courses and lectures in 2010.

Physiotherapy Committee

The committee ran the 9th Round Table meeting for physiotherapists during the ICS annual meeting. The committee is also creating a complete list of interested physiotherapist speakers for educational courses. Work was also begun on creating a website with educational, scientific and communication information for medical professionals.

Nerve Re-routing meeting

A reseach meeting was led by Jacques Corcos (ICS General Secretary) in mid October 2010. A group of experts, invited on the basis of their experience in the nerve re-routing concept and it's clinical applications, met in South Florida for a brainstorming meeting. The goal of this intensive review of existing data and in-depth discussion was to allow the International Continence Society to adopt a position regarding this technique and to decide whether future research in this field should be supported by the Society. A consultation will subsequently be held with the ICS membership.

IT Department – Development Projects

The IT department grew to 3 staff in 2010 with the addition of Chris Angle, ICS Flash Developer/Designer. He has added some key design skills to the ICS team and will be working on the new eLearning Platform, as well as many graphical design tasks within the organisation.

The General Secretary was very keen to see changes to the ICS website to make it friendlier, more useful and easier to use for our members. For some time the Publications and Communications Committee have been working on advancing the website to deliver on these challenges and much work has been done to launch it before the Toronto meeting. The new website is more than just a cosmetic change - this is probably the biggest "look and feel" change we have made on the website since the new branding designs for the ICS in 2005.

After all records were broken for Workshop and Abstract submission, this year all workshops and abstracts have been reviewed online with the latest systems being the workshops module and online video review system

The IT department has been developing a new flash based eLearning platform. The new platform will provide CME accredited eLearning content on the website. By utilising existing webcasts of workshops work is underway to transform them into eLearning modules, with video and slide presentations, handouts, multiple choice questions, evaluation and feedback and CME points and certificates.

Conticom ICS Limited

The trading subsidiary continued to support the Charity in meeting its objectives.

Financial Review

Investment Performance

Surplus funds invested during the year in interest bearing deposit accounts earned income of £3,528 (2009 £12,166)

Reserves Policy

The Trustees of ICS have adopted this reserves policy in order to determine prudent levels of financial reserves which ICS should maintain. The process for setting and monitoring the annual budget will take account of the level of reserves set by this policy. Reserves are maintained:-

- a) To provide a safeguard of two years' estimated operating costs of ICS and Conticom ICS Limited.
- b) To provide an element of contingency for unforeseen liabilities.
- c) To provide a permanent base for the Charity and safe guard future projects.

In determining the level of reserves the Trustees have taken into account the average annual combined operating costs of the last two years; 2010: £596,488; 2009: £546,698. They have also allowed, within the contingency element, a figure of £50,000 in case of liabilities arising against ICS in respect of the Annual Meeting. The Trustees consider it appropriate to retain two years' operating costs as ICS operates on an annual cycle and its key annual event (the Annual Meeting) has to be pre-planned on a four year cycle. Therefore, the aimed level of reserves for year ended 31.12.2010 should be two years at an average of £571,593 plus the contingency of £50,000, giving a total of £1,193,186.

The Annual Meeting is an annual international medical and scientific conference for specialists in the medical and scientific disciplines relevant to the charitable objects of ICS. Organisation of the Annual Meeting is contracted to an organiser (this has been Kenes International, since 2008 and will continue to be until 2014), by Conticom ICS Limited (the wholly-owned trading subsidiary of ICS).

The terms of the relevant agreement (on which legal advice was taken) provide for the organiser to accept all financial risks and for a proportion of any net surplus to be passed to ICS via Conticom ICS Limited. However, notwithstanding the provision regarding financial risks, the trustees consider it prudent to retain the contingency figure stated in case any liability should be alleged against ICS in the event of a major failure of the Annual Meeting, such as cancellation.

As of 31st December 2010, the consolidated balance sheet showed the Charity and its subsidiary had combined carried forward funds of £1,760,667, (2009: £1,681,925). The Trustees are aware of the surplus reserves held and are considering ways in which to utilise these extra funds in line with the charitable aims of the Charity.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources of the Charity in the year were the annual meeting income of £503,986 (2009: £467,214), membership fees £118,433 (2009: £112,116) and donations and gifts totalling £42,207 (2009: £20,342).

With this funding the Charity has been able to finance the annual meeting in Toronto, additional educational activities, the running costs of the ICS Office and continues to produce the membership book and newsletters and the subscriptions to the NUU Journal. In addition it has allowed the Trustees, Executive, Education, Publication and Communication and Continence Promotion

Committees to meet outside of the Annual Meeting which has been found to be extremely useful in driving forward their ongoing projects.

The total profits of the trading subsidiary were £339,717 (2009: £267,268), of which £338,432 (2009: £266,444) was gifted to the Charity to minimise any tax liability. The Trustees are pleased with the commercial success of the subsidiary which supports the Charity in meeting its objectives.

Resources Expended

The principle resources expended of the Charity in the year were Educational Activities £141,436 (2009: £96,641), Publication of Research £173,863 (2009: £171,331), Annual Meeting expenditure £164,276 (2009: £200,029) and Governance Costs £116,913 (2009: £78,697).

Investment Powers and Policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to invest in any way the Trustees wish. The Trustees, having regard to the liquidity requirements of operating the Charity and to the reserves policy, operated a policy of keeping approximately 50% of total funds available in interest bearing, yet instant access accounts. During the year, the remaining 50% was deposited into a fixed rate bond account, to gain a better rate of interest with minimal related risk.

Plans for Future Periods

The Board of Trustees will continue its work surrounding the strategy and continue its work within the taskforces with the aim to produce more projects and activities that meet the charitable aims of the society. The following initiatives planned for 2011 will draw on the excess reserves held by the society and will extend the charitable activities of the ICS.

ICS Annual Meeting 2011

Chair-Ian Ramsay

The 41^{st} Annual Meeting of the International Continence Society will take place at the Scottish Exhibition and Conference Centre (SECC) in Glasgow, Scotland. This will be the second time the ICS annual meeting has been held in Glasgow, with 1975 being the first occasion. The meeting will open with ever popular ICS workshops programme ($29^{th} - 20^{th}$ August), and will be followed by the diverse scientific programme (31^{st} August to 2^{nd} September) which will cover the cutting edge science that has come to be expected of the ICS meeting. The ICS expects this to be one of the most socially exciting meetings too, with plenty of Scottish spirit and flavour.

ICS History

The ICS History book, encapsulating the first 40 years of the ICS, is planned to be unveiled at the annual meeting in Glasgow. Sincere thanks go to Ted Arnold, Eric Glen and Norman Zimmer for their time and dedication in creating this momentous publication.

Continence Promotion Committee Public Forum & World Continence Week

The CPC will once again focus on the World Continence Week and ensure a public forum occurs in Glasgow.

Awards and Fellowships

An increase in the number of awards and fellowship opportunities available to members. This will include two research grants per year.

IT Department – Development Projects

<u>E-Learning</u>: Rolling out the eLearning System to members, filming more workshops and creating more online video eLearning content.

<u>ICS Research Community Network</u>: This initiative will create a database to store members interested in participating in research projects to allow members to network and create teams and find volunteer centres for their studies.

<u>ICS Faculty</u>: Creating an ICS Faculty database to store speakers from ICS courses, their interests, specialty, educational qualifications, geographical location and feedback from past events. <u>Affiliates Admin</u>: A streamlined user-friendly system to allow admin staff to import affiliate members.

2011 Educational Courses

The following Educational Courses are currently planned for 2011.

• Add-on course, Dubai

- Add-on course, Vietnam
- Add-on course, Brazil
- Add-on course, Colombia
- Add-on course, China
- Add-on course, Slovenia

Cadaver Course

The ICS will investigate the feasibility of running a cadaveric training course, once per year in Porto, Portugal. The focus of the course would be to allow up to 6 delegates (young surgeons) to receive hands on surgical training on pelvic floor reconstruction. The course would be open to all international delegates with a preference for trainees and residents in Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive surgery and/or Male Urology and those working in developing and resource-constrained countries.

Fistula Course

Building on the success of the 2010 course in Cairo, the newly formed Fistula Committee aims to hold two more fistula training courses in 2011. These will again be primarily aimed at applicants from lesser developed countries. Possible destinations for the course include Uganda, China and a return to Egypt.

Trustees' Responsibilities in Relation to the Financial Statements

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2005), Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

b) Group Accounts

The results of Conticom - ICS Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary, have been consolidated on a line by line basis in the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance sheet. Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement under FRS 1 has been taken.

c) Company Status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

d) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

e) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Incoming resources from subscriptions are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities on a calendar year basis and are deferred where they are received in advance.

f) Resources Expended

All expenditure included in the Statement of Financial Activities is accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the educational activities and the provision of membership services and includes both the direct costs and support costs relating to these activities. Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, e.g. staff costs by their time spent and other costs by their usage. Any irrecoverable VAT is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities or capitalised as part of the asset cost, where appropriate.

g) Tangible Fixed Assets Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Fixtures and fittings - 25% on cost

Computer equipment - 33% on reducing balance

h) Company Investments

The investment in the subsidiary is stated at cost.

i) Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

j) Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period to which they relate.

k) Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable for the year are charged in the Statement of Financial Activities.
