ICS 2005 - Montreal



The 35th Annual Meeting of the International Continence Society is rapidly approaching and will be held at the prestigious Palais des congres Centre in Montreal, Canada. Jacques Corcos, host for ICS 2005 has promised an exciting and informative scientific programme in which results from the latest discoveries and cutting edge research will be presented. In addition the latest practical innovations from the fields of urology, urogynaecology, physiotherapy, pharmacology and urodynamics will be displayed in the exhibition area. Also on offer will be a range of social activities allowing delegates to sample a slice of Canadian

Attendance at the 34th Annual Meeting in Paris reached a record high of well over 3,000 delegates and we hope to attract a similar attendance for the 2005 meeting.

ICS Educational Course in Barcelona

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Scientific Committee

The Scientific Committee has recently undertaken the task of assessing the 895 abstracts submitted to ICS for the Annual Meeting in Montreal. Applicants should now have been informed as to the success of their submission.

By April 1, 2005, ICS office had received a total of 895 abstracts. This was the highest-ever number of abstracts submitted for a purely ICS Annual Meeting, showing that it is recognised as the leading scientific meeting on incontinence.

The 12 members of the ICS 2005 Scientific Committee come from a multidisciplinary clinical and basic science background and were asked to review and score an average of 300 abstracts, in order to have at least three reviewers scoring the same abstract. Scores were compiled and analysed. In the first week of May, a 4-day scientific meeting was held in North Hatley, Québec, Canada to put together the scientific programme.



Under the chairmanship of Erick Schick and the guidance of the scientific coordinator Guus Kramer, the members of the Scientific Committee discussed abstracts proposed for rejection, abstracts with high discrepancies in reviewer scores, those reviewed by less than three members of the Scientific Committee or any other abstracts flagged for review.

Unfortunately, 188 abstracts were rejected for not following the abstract submission rules (not being



anonymous, being incomplete, missing subtitles or not conforming with ICS terminology). The scores of each reviewer were calculated, normalized and then compiled.

After two full days of discussion, Programme selection and construction, the committee came up with a preliminary scientific programme.

On the third day, the Chair of the ICS Education Committee, Linda Cardozo, helped ensure that the Scientific Committee had produced a well balanced final programme of value to the diverse clinical and non-clinical delegates attending ICS meetings each year.

Chair selection and abstract award selection were completed. Finally, on the fourth day, the committee met one last time to debrief and review the evaluation process.

On a personal note, I feel privileged as a young researcher to have been working with such a competent, efficient and dedicated group. I am proud to see the exceptionally high quality and multidisciplinary nature of the 2005 scientific programme.

ICS posts

This year's elections for the ICS Scientific Committee Posts of Standardisation Committee Chair, Clinical and Non-Clinical representatives were balloted on the ICS website.

The voting system employed by ICS is known as the single transferable vote; this allows a fair representation of the votes and this is the first time the method has been used practically by the ICS.

The ICS organization is finding its way


Over the last few years, the ICS Annual Meeting has become a more and more popular event and has witnessed a constant growth in attendance.

Evidence-Based Urology

The ICS instigated the International Consultation on Incontinence and is committed to evidence based urology as exemplified by the Cochrane library which has provided a number of authoritative evidence based reviews of both medical and surgical therapies for the treatment of bladder filling and voiding disorders. The proceedings for the Third International Consultation on Incontinence carried out under the leadership of Paul Abrams are currently being published. The next International Consultation on Benign Prostatic Hyperplasia will be in Paris between the 24th and 27th June and will apply a similar evidence based approach to the diagnosis and management of patients presenting with symptoms suggestive of bladder outlet obstruction as a consequence upon benign prostatic hyperplasia.

Innovations such as this have lead to evidence based recommendations on treatment but it is clear that a number of organisations both national and international have also produced guidelines. The ICS has been instrumental working in collaboration with the European Association of Urology, American Urology Association and the Société International d'Urologie in setting up an important innovative which aims to rationalise the evaluation of the evidence base at an international level coordinating a collation of existing guidelines from various sources and incorporating them into one evidence based approach to the management of disorders of bladder filling and voiding. A recent meeting attended by the executives of each of these organisations was held at the time of the European Association of Urology Meeting in Istanbul and further meetings have been arranged to initiate this important programme which will proceed under the chairmanship of Paul Abrams working in close collaboration with the CUD Group coordnated by Saad Khoury.



Obituary

Tage Hald

Professor Tage Hald died unexpectedly on the 29th of November 2004 at hospital in Sofia, Bulgaria. He suffered a cerebral haemorrhage whilst on a flight to visit his daughter and sadly never regained consciousness

In 1969 as a senior registrar he established one of the world's first urodynamic laboratories and thus began a life long commitment to the study of lower urinary tract dysfunction. He was truly an inspirational figure and his students benefited greatly from his enormous knowledge in this field. His scientific output over the decades was prolific and resulted in numerous peer reviewed publications.



Professor Tage Hald played a key role in the creation of the International Continence Society in 1971 and in 1973 presided over the third Annual Meeting of ICS in Copenhagen. In 1973 he also became the first Chairman of the Standardisation Committee. This committee has subsequently produced more than 20 reports which have created a set of standardised definitions accepted worldwide.

Professor Tage Hald was in a class of his own, uncompromising in his fight for what he thought was right, and considerate in relation to patients and colleagues. To his friends he was loving and faithful. He finally retired in 1999 hoping to devote more time to his family and leisure pursuits. We will miss Tage Hald and our sympathy goes to Birgitte and to all his family.
