Annual Meeting Chair ICS 2014 Rio de Janeiro

Dear Friends, Colleagues and Guests,

I would like to welcome you to the 44th ICS Annual Scientific Meeting – the first time ever in Rio de Janeiro and in South America. As in previous years, the scientific content of the meeting and dissemination of new knowledge in the field of incontinence and pelvic floor disorders during the 5 days in October will be unsurpassed anywhere.

Carlos D'Ancona, Meeting Chair, and the local organising committee have put together a memorable social programme with a distinctly

Brazilian theme. Nucelio Lemos heads this year's Scientific Committee. The committee considered over nine hundred abstracts that were submitted and triply reviewed. The programme includes 42 podium, 253 podium posters, and 10 podium videos as well as 401 open discussion posters, 18 open discussion videos, and 84 read by title.

The State-of-the-Art sessions will include a lecture on Aging and Nitric Oxide by Gilberto de Nucci, one of the most highly cited biomedical scientists in the world. The other sessions will be Living with Pelvic Floor Dysfunction and its Psychosocial



Consequences, and Neuromodulation Round Table: Past Present and Future. There will also be a special Ethics Lecture by Professor Alex London, from Carnegie Mellon University. Other highlights are Meet the Experts, the Nursing Forum, Pelvic Floor Exercise Class, Physiotherapy Round Table. There are 40 basic and advanced workshops from which to choose. As always, there are multiple other sessions and meetings that will keep the SulAmérica Convention Centre busy throughout the meeting.

This has been a year of consolidation for the ICS. Barcelona was a clear success in all respects and helped put the organisation back on track for the future. Over the course of the year, the Trustees worked very hard at work in completing the tasks recommended in the Strategic Plan. We worked on increasing, improving, and communicating the intellectual and scientific output of the Society. We are proposing a whole host of bylaws additions and amendments to improve the structure and function of the society. We continue to work on improving the current financial structure and securing professional advice on ensuring future financial health. We are working very closely with the Committee Chairs in reviewing and revising the Committee Structure to ensure that it reflects the goals and aims of the Society. All of this work takes time and I hope that you as a member can appreciate the commitment that so many volunteers are putting into the ICS to ensure a bright future.

Despite the new reality of fiscal restraint, accountability, and transparency the ICS still managed to maintain the office intact and conduct successful programmes, courses, and workshops around the world. This is my final meeting as General Secretary and I am very pleased that the next General Secretary, Adrian Wagg, is so knowledgeable and skilled and will provide excellent leadership to the organisation. I wish him all the best in his new position.

I would like to thank all of you who are attending this meeting and those who will join the meeting through our extensive online activities.



CME Accreditation for the ICS 2014 Annual Meeting and Workshops

The 44th Annual Meeting of the International Continence Society was granted 27 European CME credits (ECMEC) by the European Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (EACCME).

European Accreditation

European Accreditation is granted by the EACCME in order to allow participants who attend the above-mentioned activity to validate their credits in their own country.

Accreditation Statement

The '44th Annual Meeting of the International Continence Society' is accredited by the European Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (EACCME) to provide the following CME activity for medical specialists. The EACCME is an institution of the European Union of Medical Specialists (UEMS), www.uems.net.

The '44th Annual Meeting of the International Continence Society' is designated for a maximum of (or 'for up to') 27 hours of European external CME credits. Each medical specialist should claim only those hours of credit that he/she actually spent in the educational activity.

Through an agreement between the European Union of Medical Specialists and the American Medical Association, physicians may convert EACCME credits to an equivalent number of AMA PRA Category 1 Credits™. Information on the process to convert EACCME credit to AMA credit can be found at www.ama-assn.org/go/internationalcme

Live educational activities, occurring outside of Canada, recognised by the UEMS-EACCME for ECMEC credits are deemed to be Accredited Group Learning Activities (Section 1) as defined by the Maintenance of Certification Program of The Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

EACCME credits

Each medical specialist should claim only those hours of credit that he/she actually spent in the educational activity. The EACCME credit system is based on 1 ECMEC per hour with a maximum of 3 ECMECs for half a day and 6 ECMECs for a full-day event.

Speakers' Ready Room

The Speakers' Ready Room is located on Level 2 of the Conference Venue. All Podium, Poster and invited speakers for workshops are required to submit their presentations to the Speakers' Ready Room well in advance of their presentation, and up to 1 hour before the beginning of the session.

All presenters will be required to complete a disclosure slide shown at the start of their presentation in order to present their work. The speaker ready room staff will assist you to complete this.

 return it to the main poster area.

Open Discussion Posters:

Open-discussion posters at the ICS Annual Meeting are poster presentations accepted to be displayed at the congress in the poster area. Authors will have the opportunity to present their work to delegates.

ICS Poster Pilots



Alex John London is Professor of Philosophy and Director of the *Center for Ethics and Policy* at Carnegie Mellon University. Professor London is an elected **Fellow of the Hastings Center** and recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from the American Society of Bioethics and Humanities (ASBH) and a **New Directions Fellowship** from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Professor London's research focuses on foundational ethical issues in human-subjects research, issues of social justice in the trans-national context, and on methodological issues in theoretical and applied ethics. His papers have appeared in Science, The Lancet, PLoS Medicine, Statistics In Medicine, The Hastings Center Report, and numerous other journals and collections. He is co-editor of Ethical Issues in Modern Medicine, one of the most widely used textbooks in medical ethics and has been commissioned to write papers for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Institute of Medicine (IOM). In 2012 he joined the Working Group on the Revision of the CIOMS 2002 International Ethical Guidelines for Biomedical Research Involving Human Subjects and in 2011 he was appointed to the Steering Committee on Forensic Science Programs for the International Commission on Missing Persons (ICMP). Since 2007 he has served as a member of the Ethics Working Group of the HIV Prevention Trials Network.

- Community benefits in international research
- Considerations regarding the standard of care and prevention and whether these should ever differ between high- and low-income countries





Sling surgery is the most common procedure performed to treat stress urinary incontinence(SUI) in women. Although most women are cured of incontinence after surgery, a small minority develop voiding dysfunction clinically manifested as significant post-void residual, poor flow rate, urgency and urgency incontinence or pelvic pain which quite often are not easy to deal with. In the absence of clear guidelines, evaluation and management of post-sling voiding dysfunction continues to be controversial particularly in regards to time and choices of therapy. The aim of this workshop is to discuss the different options for the evaluation and management of voiding dysfunction after sling surgery for SUI.
