
Elise De, Chairman

2017 Workshops – Some new innovations

- Range of topics including 2 hands-on laparoscopic workshops (excellent additions)

Ethics Committee report, 2017

Please note this document will be updated after an Ethics Committee (EC) teleconference and forum in August, 2017.

1. EC Committee Membership

After stabilisation of the committee last year with the addition of 4 members to reach what was felt to be an optimum member total (10, including the Chair), the position of Chair was up for election this year. Nina Davis was re-elected. EC membership now stands as follows:

2. Activities/Achievements

 The ICS 2016 EC free workshop (Core Curriculum), Ethical Issues in Professional and Research Practice: An Intermediate Level Workshop enjoyed spirited participation and received generally strong ratings from attendees. The cases and summaries of the key points were to serve to direct discussion among the participants. Our intent was to create an effective and enjoyable learning activity, but, also, to prompt discussion that would lead to topics for presentation in future ethics forums.

- Based on the success of last year's workshop, this year's contribution is an advanced workshop entitled The Ethics of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) and Other Urogenital Interventions: An Interactive Workshop. This workshop will take place on Wednesday afternoon, 13 September. The session will be moderated by Cristina Naranjo-Ortiz who will discuss the sociological and cultural background of FGM. Ruwan Fernando will direct discussion about the legal and ethical ramifications of FGM; and Tamara Dickinson will compare and contrast the ethical issues surrounding male infant circumcision, intersex surgery and genital plastic surgery. We look forward to a lively exchange.
- As our second major project during the past year, the EC successfully put forth a proposal to the Trustees to create a new award, the Best Ethics Poster Award which carries a £500 prize. The proposal came from Alvaro Bedoya-Rongo and was enthusiastically supported by the entire EC. In spite of efforts to publicise the new award on the abstract application site, in the ICS e-News, and elsewhere, no appropriate abstracts were submitted for the Tokyo meeting, so no award was given last year. This year's PR efforts started early on several fronts beginning with a mention by Kari Tikkinen at the Early Career Session. Also, sample abstracts were written as examples and linked to the process for submission of abstracts in the Ethics category. Finally, several articles were written for the ICS e-News to encourage submissions, especially by trainees and early career members. The response was modest, but a solid start for a new award category. It is anticipated that the award will be given this year, and it is hoped that the number and quality of the submissions will increase in each successive year.
- Members of the EC were asked by General Secretary Mourad to monitor the live surgery activities being held for the first time at ICS 2018. It is anticipated that this will be an ongoing activity for the EC as it aligns nicely with our TOR.
- The EC is grateful for the efforts of **Heidi Moossdorff-Steinhauser** who has significantly expanded the EC microsite. She has upgraded the photographs and added educational content such as the lecture by Suzy Elneil on the ethics of fistula management presented at last year's workshop.
- The EC continued to "cross-pollinate" with the Publications Committee by supplying the ICS e-News with articles presenting timely ethics-related content.

3. Future Projects and Activities

• The EC will continue to provide a workshop, debate, or other educational activity for next year's Annual Meeting.

- The EC will develop materials with ethics-related content as its contribution to the ICS Core Curriculum. A needs assessment may be the best way to ensure that EC efforts are directed toward producing materials deemed of benefit to the Society. We will work with the ICS Office to query the membership.
- The EC will continue to ensure the integrity of the academic activities of the ICS.
- Based on the sessions presented at ICS 2018, consideration should be given to developing an SOP for EC monitoring of live surgical activities at the ICS annual meetings.
- The EC will continue to expand its microsite with educational content so that it will also serve as an informational resource for membership.

4. Budget Request

The EC budget request for 2017-18 has been appended to this report.

1 Publication activities

2 Teaching activities

The NU committee and the education committee took part to some educational activities and members will report on it at the business meeting.

The choice is to have committee activities and/or ICS activities dedicated to neurourology through regional and/or national meetings and to focus less on individual meetings except major neurourology worldwide reknown centers.

The committee produced video recordings after the past Tokyo meeting (available on the ICS website) and plan to do so again after the Florence meetings. The number of teaching recorded sessions will be 3 including basic and advances teachings.

3 International Relationship and specially with the annual international neurourology meeting (Zurich)

As a decision from the ICS board, discussed with the committee chair, no future activities will be planned between both associations/committees. This decision will be clearly discussed at the next business meeting in Florence with all committee members to clarify and suggest balanced relationship.

4 Other topics to discuss:

- Promotion of neurourology:
- E-learning is increasing its content through the AV ICS process.

- All committee members are requested to take part and to promote NU activities under the label of the ICS NU committee. Any other promotion may be confusing.
- Request for a budget dedicated to a specific MOOC for rehabilitation physicians (P Denys and B Schurch). Ongoing process, close to final acceptance with ICS office and board.
- Neurourology in developing countries: a special section of our committee could focus more on this specific topic and suggest some ideas to help colleagues to join us or to be interviewed to know more about their wishes.
- The SIU/ICUD conference on SCI will be published at next SIU meeting. The committee suggest that ICS (through its general secretary) could promote this publication with SIU through its website and under the NU committee webpage.
- Fellowship positions: to be discussed with a final report on selected candidates for NU fellowship positions and follow up of this process.
- Development of an ICS educational website including NU promotion. Rizwan Hamid has been assigned this task by the ICS board in agreement with ICS NU promotion committee chair. To be discussed in Florence.

Budget request:

None at that moment for the committee but to be planned for future AV recordings (ICS annual congress) and any new ICS educational course which could be produced as an annual extra event of the NU committee.

The Nursing Committee is comprised of three subcommittees, Education and Practice, Research, and Communications, and creates task forces as needed to complete various special projects.

This past year, the task force for creating a best practice document about bladder and bowel training continued and one for promoting clinical fellowships to ICS nurse members was formed. The Nursing Committee chairperson, subcommittee and task force chairs, and committee members work together on activities.

Education and Practice Related Activities

Activities during the past year

- Planned the Nursing Forum and Nursing Workshop for the 2017 annual conference in Florence
 - Included local nurse presenters living in the country hosting the ICS annual meeting, Italy, as well as ICS Nursing Committee members in both the forum and workshop
 - Sponsorship was obtained for translating the Nursing Forum and Nursing Workshop into Italian
 - The nurse member of the local ICS meeting planning committee volunteers to translate the slides of guest speakers into Italian
 - This year the nurse liaison to ICS Education Committee will participate in at the Nursing Forum and explain her role and activities
- Speakers for ICS Educational Courses
 - Donna Bliss and nurse liaison to ICS Education Committee (Frankie Bates) assisted a member from Brazil prepare an application to the ICS Education Committee requesting funding for a speaker (Janis Miller) to attend SOBEST, which was funded and will take place in November 2017
 - Nursing Committee assisted in identifying nurse speakers for the EAUN conference in March 2017 in London (Sharon Eustice) and the upcoming PACS conference in 2018 (Sharon Eustice)
 - Donna Bliss submitted a proposal to the ICS Education Committee to fund 2 speakers to a conference of the Chinese Urology Association Nurses (CUAN) planned for Nov. 2017, which was approved. After the visit by Donna and Kathleen, CUAN stated that it would like to establish a partnership with ICS for Nursing Committee members to provide education about incontinence management to Chinese nurses. Discussions are ongoing between ICS and CUAN.
 - Donna Bliss developed a presentation about history of ICS Nursing Committee that she presented in China and is available to other committee members for use; she plans to make the presentation during the Nursing Forum in 2018 at the Nursing Forum as there does not seem to be time at the Florence session
- Creating Educational resources

- Nursing Committee members completed work on their respective committees, writing chapters of the ICS-ICI6 book, *Incontinence*, 6th ed.
- Donna Bliss is editing a book on *Fecal Incontinence Management for the Advanced Practice Nurse* to be published by Springer FR. The vast majority of authors are ICS members. Donna Bliss' proposal to ICS to endorse the book was approved by the ICS Trustees.
- Currently reviewers of the book are being sought.
- The book is planned to be published in time for the 2018 ICS meeting in Philadelphia.
- Progress on e-learning activities:
 - There are three educational modules that Mary Wilde made on (1) Basic Care in Indwelling Urinary Catheter Management, (2) Self-Management of Indwelling Urinary Catheters, and (3) Self-Management of Intermittent Urinary Catheters available on the ICS website.
 - Kathleen Hunter's session on medications for UI was filmed in Montreal and it is current posted on the ICS website: <u>https://www.ics.org/2015/programme/session/1642</u>
- Progress Report on Bladder and Bowel Training Best Practice Statement (BPS)
 - The draft statement on Bladder Training is completed and the draft of the Bowel Training statement is in progress. This will be completed to present to the Nursing Forum at the ICS annual meeting in Florence. A formal Delphi-like review process will be established to validate the content of the document. Twenty volunteers will be sought to participate in a threestage blinded review process. We will seek volunteers during the Nursing Forum meeting in Florence and aim to have the process completed by the end of 2017.

The PCC has overseen and contributed to the ICS E-News, Social Media output, and Urology News.

• PCC Composition:

Since the Tokyo meeting we have increased membership by 4 increasing the diversity of disciplines within the committee thus improving the content we contribute to the ICS E-news. The new members are: Nucelio Lemos, Riyad Al Mousa, Ran Pang and Julien Renard. Sophie Fletcher remains ICS E-news editor as does Jerzy Gajewski our Trustee liaise. We have now increased committee membership to 9, over the 3 we were allotted in 2015.

• E-news:

Each committee member is responsible for one latest scientific article review every 3 months and two Social Media contributions per month, in addition members are encouraged to contribute, "pieces" of interest on an ad hoc basis. 
working smoothly. We also continue to garner articles of interest from outside affiliate's i.e. recent article on Alan Cotteden's award, as well as individual ICS committees.

With help from the ICS office, we developed a process for committee Chair's and the Board of Trustees to deliver reports to the ICS membership in a timely manner.


Below are the top 10 articles for all of 2015 and until the end of May 2016*:

The ICS office promoted eNews on all social media platforms encouraging people to subscribe. As this graph highlights over the last 8 months our database has increased by just under 800 people.





If you compare this with the industry average open rate (22.56) ICS is under performing. This is an area that the PCC can review going forward, it may be that we need to look at more targeted mailers to members/subscribers or reducing the number of mailers sent from the office.

But our Click through rate this year at 3.99 is higher than the industry average (2.48). So, whilst the open rate is lower than we would like the engagement with subscribers is good.




On average eNews generates 403 visits to the ICS website.




Social Media

ICS Twitter followers have increased by 1291 people (107%) since January 2015 and 492 people (25%) since August last year.



- The page likes is how many people have liked the ICS Facebook page.
- Engagement is when people like, click, share or comment a post.
- Reach is how many people have seen an ICS post based on someone liking, commenting or sharing an ICS post.



The key increase we have seen over the last year is the reach of our Facebook posts, our posts are regularly seen by 30,000 people plus.

• ICS debate topics in NAU

It has been agreed in principle by the NAU Editor, Roger Dmochowski and Wiley that the PCC can publish quarterly debates in the journal. These will be 150 word pro and con articles to be published in Wiley as open access documents. The ICS office will then promote these debates on their social media platforms. The aim is to increase traffic to the journal and create engagement with members and non-members. The debates will as well be available online for comments/discussion, it has yet to be determined on which platform the "discussions" will take place – either Wiley or the ICS, and (both open access).

This initiative is led by PCC members: Nucelio Lemos and Stergios Doumouchtsis, and the Standardisation Steering Committee has also agreed to participate and contribute to at least debate topic.

Debate topics will be discussed at the PCC 2017 meeting in Florence and our aim is to see the first debate published by the New Year.

Scientific Committee Annual Report 2017

Following a very successful Scientific Program Meeting, which took place from May 2nd to 5th in Rome, The Committee is pleased to report:

A further and significant increase in the number of abstracts submitted to 1158. This certainly suggests an increased interest in the ICS as a worthwhile meeting to present original work. The committee do however recognise that increased numbers alone do not reflect our drive to continually improve the quality of work presented. With this in mind Steinar Hunskaar presented his considerations on how we can continue to improve the quality of presented work.

This is based on minimising variance, by ensuring as far as possible, scorers only mark areas where they have genuine expertise, and a reduction in repetitive integer scoring (1,1,1, 2,2,2 etc.) which skew the system and which appear to have been used buy some non-committee members, as their only means of trying to ensure rejection of an abstract breaching inclusion rules.

Steiner's recommendations are:

- Every scientific committee member should aim to review 200 abstract.
- Every marker to watch a 2 min video to refresh marking skills and hopefully therefore mark to the same criteria using more of the scale.
- Aim for 5 markers for each abstract and then eliminate top and bottom to use only 3 marks to give final score.
- IT set to prevent more than 5 markers per abstract.
- If only 4 markers, then eliminate the score that is causing the greatest variance.
- IT to produce a button to allow non-scientific committee members to suggest rejection because of breaking the rules.

These recommendations have been accepted by the committee and will be implemented for the next round of abstracts in April 2018.

The shortened Program Meeting was very successful and allowed sufficient time for the production of a full meeting program over the two days. This two day format will be

continued for next year. Although we recognize the financial pressure to try and reduce this further it is the considered opinion of the committee that a face to face meeting remains essential.

Feedback from Tokyo on the rapid communication format of very short presentation, was not favourable. Most of the questions from the floor were about information that would have been presented if they had been given more time or there was no time for questions. Very little if any useful discussion took place. We have therefore decided to abandon this format in the Florence meeting in favour of more e-posters.

We had much discussion about the increasing use of parallel sessions. This however appears inevitable as we try to accommodate increasing numbers of submitted abstracts, and although we recognize this increase in numbers is good for the ICS as a whole, it cannot be allowed to be at the expense of quality.

An alternative model would be to restrict the number of abstracts presented and provide additional time for discussion, even structured discussion, which would provide greater audience participation, and greater added value.


This may initially reduce the numbers attending, as those with rejected abstracts may not, or not be able to attend. But if the value of the meeting was viewed to have increased greatly, more delegates are likely to return even if they are not presenting.


This balance between being an outlet for juniors to present their work and therefore attend the meeting, and providing a showcase for cutting edge clinical and scientific work attracting interested delegates is one we must address to determine the role of the Annual meeting. The ultimate shape and role of our annual meeting, however, must be determined by the board.

The introduction of live surgery will be explored in Florence. We expect this to be a success with the great experience of Prof Giulio Del Popolo in running other such live surgery events. We aim to present live surgery of interest to both Urologists and gynaecologists, in the hope that this will help further encourage engagement from our gynaecology colleagues to attend future ICS meetings.

The committee's design structure and process to develop teaching modules are adopted by the education committee as well as by the board and trustees.

Urodynamics Committee has cooperated with;

Neurourology committee (see the above). Physiotherapy committee: module(s)) not yet established.

If availability of camera allows we will **try out talking head (studio) presentation** and recording. First module in ICS studio recorded 2015 (pressure flow analysis) **Other modules and translations to record in Bristollywood.**

A standard and specific ICS layout for slides is included in the committee's manual for the working groups. All existing modules have been transformed tot the new ICS teaching modules layout.

There are **no plans for subcommittees**. The committee steers ad hoc working groups.

The urodynamics committee starts with a new chairman this year >sept 2017. The committee may decide to(also) focus on technical evaluation, development and testing of techniques as accessory to education, depending on communication and coordination with the (new- interim) director of the school of urodynamics.
