Aims of Workshop

The goal of the course from the ICS Ethics Committee is to provide pelvic floor specialists with comprehensive knowledge needed to recognize:

- 1. The history of women's sexual rights, our evolving perceptions of women's bodies, and the historical background that has stunted scientific progress in women's sexual health
- 2. The ethical dilemmas at play in our patient encounters and within the framework of healthcare that women have to navigate to seek treatment for sexual or pelvic floor concerns
- 3. The anatomical and hormonal ramifications that must be understood by all providers
- 4. How we provide comprehensive sexual health guidance to women in an ethical and compassionate way that considers the historical contexts and the need for advocacy

Educational Objectives

The participants will engage and interact with the course faculty through:

- 1. Guided didactic sessions with ample audience survey response questions and live feeds
- 2. Case-based scenarios that will require audience input
- 3. A "mock trial" in which a staged deposition is heard regarding an ethical issue relating to women, their sexuality, and pelvic floor health.

The outline of this workshop is intended to denote for the course participants how care for women's health, their sexuality, and their pelvic floor expand beyond the patient encounter and into the domains of history, the healthcare system at large, our societal constraints, our justice systems and bioethics in general

This comprehensive knowledge will be incredibly applicable to the course participants as it will provide great "take aways" and talking points all within a highly interactive framework that will make the course fun and incredibly thought-provoking!
